While there are many needs worth addressing, we intend this report to highlight the ones that have an exponential effect on the flourishing of every person.


In 2019, we set out to establish a preview of what we hope will become a trusted guide in subsequent years for navigating our community's needs and dreams. We hope you'll read it, digest it, pull people together, and act on it.

HOUSING STABILITY

One of the five areas we are highlighting in the pilot report that exponentially impacts individual flourishing is housing.

Without stable housing, individuals, children, and families struggle to survive. Insecure housing is more concentrated in neighborhoods with higher levels of poverty, which are typically characterized by older, less energy-efficient houses.

"Stable housing" means housing that is available, safe, and affordable. As the graph to the right illustrates, someone making minimum wage would have to work 82 hours per week to afford a two-bedroom apartment, which equates to two full time jobs.

CHILD WELFARE

Just over 1 in 5 third graders are not reading at grade level, and it is something our community must prioritize. The students in that 21% are four times less likely to graduate from high school.


Child welfare includes third grade literacy, child homelessness, education, health, and abuse. Though sexual and physical abuse decreased between 2008 and 2017, neglect cases increased by 43%.

Children often face the unintended consequences of adult decisions and actions and have little power to change their situation. A city for everyone makes the most vulnerable populations the most cared for populations.

RACIAL UNITY

A flourishing city is one where racial unity is realized and expressed. In Evansville, it is clear we are largely divided across minority populations. Empathy, listening, patience, and understanding are needed to have racial unity.

Segregation of events, churches, and neighborhoods contribute to a lack of racial unity. As minority populations increase and the majority population decreases, we must learn to work together with trust as a unified community.

MENTAL WELLNESS

Mental health issues can be constant inhibitors to the flourishing of every person. Without proper treatment, they can prevent people from maintaining employment or caring for their children.

Our substance abuse crisis is well-documented, but it is often dismissed as the consequence of individual decisions, despite the negative effects it is having on our families and community. The shame and social stigma of addiction and other mental health issues often drives those most in need of community further into isolation.

ECONOMIC POTENTIAL

Jobs, income, and the ability to flourish are intertwined, and Evansville families are wrestling with financial insecurity at alarming rates. 1 in 10 people in the city have a household income of less than \$10,000 per year. This is significantly below the poverty level, and it is five times less than a livable wage.

Although thousands of jobs are available in the region, many factors keep people from filling those jobs. For our city to flourish, we need the right jobs, the right workforce, and the right pay. Businesses and workers need to make the necessary investments in each other to increase economic flourishing.
